Altmar-Parish-Williamstown students in Mrs. Ruffos' UPK class were ecstatic when Whiskey the certified trailing bloodhound stopped by, accompanied by Investigator Dylan Holden and Deputy Emilie Mullin of the Oswego County Sheriff's Office.

Investigator Holden and Whiskey are volunteer members of the Oswego County Search and Rescue Team, using Whiskey's remarkable skills to search for missing people. The duo offers their services to multiple agencies such as fire departments, sheriff's offices, state police, forest rangers and city police departments.

Investigator Holden explained to the class why bloodhounds are such great search and rescue dogs.

"The excess skin on their forehead covers their eyes

when they put their head down and allows for their sense of smell to take over," he said. "They also have extremely large ears which help guide the smells to their noses."

Whiskey sprung into action during a search and rescue demonstration where an older student hid on school grounds. The UPK class erupted into applause when the friendly bloodhound successfully tracked the student down using only the scent of her used T-shirt.

"Whiskey's capabilities are amazing," said Deputy Mullin. "He is great at his job and loves to work, especially when kids are involved."

Brennon Culkin won first place in both Website Design and Social Media Strategies, Julianna Britton won first place in District 9 FBLA Brochure, Kendall Wheeler took first place in Word Processing and third place in Spreadsheet Applications, Leah Tanner won first place in Electronic Career Portfolio and took third place in both Job Interview and Marketing, Kenneth DuPont won first place in International Business, Aaron Hart won second place in Agribusiness and Adrianna Lopez took second place in Economics.

The club was also recognized on the national level for three awards: The Shaping Success Award, the Service Season Award and the CTE Celebration Award. These awards position the students as contenders to win the Gold Champion Charter Award, which will be announced at a leadership conference in Orlando, Florida this June.

Next up for the club is advancement to the state FBLA competition in April, which will take place in Rochester.

APW Conservation Club Once Again Attains Status as Ocean Guardian School

For the third year in a row, members of the Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Conservation Club have completed the steps necessary to become an official National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Ocean Guardian School.

As outlined on the NOAA website, designation as an Ocean Guardian School signifies a firm commitment to the protection and conservation of its local watersheds, the world's ocean and special ocean areas such as national marine sanctuaries. The school makes this commitment by proposing and then implementing a school or community-based conservation project.

This year, the students elected to focus their efforts on recycling and reducing single-use plastic waste. This included several beach and state park clean ups, plastic collection and the sale of sustainable products to reduce waste at school, community outreach, education and a public project introduction.

Under the guidance of advisor Jessica Halsey, Conservation Club members Rachel Spencer, Noah Spencer, Eben Alley and Annaleah Wejko introduced their project while sharing about the importance of ocean conservation during a recent APW Board of Education meeting.

"I am very proud of the Conservation Club officers," explained Halsey. "It can be very intimidating presenting in front of people, let alone their Board of Education. These students practiced extremely hard, did an outstanding job and clearly care about the future of our ocean."

APW Junior-Senior High School Prepares for Total Solar Eclipse

Residents of Oswego County are in the direct path to witness a total solar eclipse on April 8 of this year, a phenomenon that hasn't happened since 1925, and Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Junior-Senior High School is getting ready for the event by providing educational opportunities for both students and the community.

A team from SUNY Oswego working with the Nationwide Eclipse Ballooning Project (NEBP) hosted a workshop for APW seventh graders recently. The NEBP acquires eclipse data and analysis through scientific helium-filled weather ballooning. Students listened to in-depth presentations about the project and engaged in hands-on activities.

APW JSHS is hosting Solar Eclipse Community Nights to teach the public about eclipse safety and to share eclipse activities. These were held on Feb. 29 and March 13 at 5:30 p.m. in room 113, with an upcoming event set for April 2 at 5:30 p.m. in the JSHS Cafeteria.

The district is giving staff and students a half day on April 8 to ensure their safety with the anticipated influx of travelers coming to the area. UPK Lottery 2024-2025

All children who will be four years of age on or before December 1, 2024 can participate in the UPK Lottery. Please complete the form on our website if you would like your child to be included in our UPK Lottery. We anticipate having full-day and half-day spots available that are funded through the New York State Universal Pre-K Grant.

The requirements to be able to sign up your UPK child in the lottery are as follows:

- The child must be living with a legal parent/guardian in the APW School District
- The child must turn four years old on or before December 1, 2024
- The child cannot be five years old or older on or before December 1, 2024

You must complete one form per child. Please complete the UPK Lottery Google Form by Friday, April 5, 2024. Fill out all sections and remember to click "Submit" in order for your lottery application to be received. The district is not responsible for entries not submitted.

If your child is selected for the UPK Program, you will receive an acceptance letter after April 29, 2024. The acceptance letter will contain instructions on how to complete the registration process, which will occur online after the receipt of the acceptance letter.

You ONLY have to fill out the UPK lottery form. No other paperwork is necessary at this time. Please complete the form once for each child you are entering into the lottery. Registration with the district will occur following the lottery and notification of selection.

APW CSD Seeks Taxpayer Approval for Land Purchase Adjacent to School

As the Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Central School District continues to plan for future growth and programming needs, it has identified the potential purchase of land adjacent to the school as a critical step. This purchase is contingent upon taxpayer approval with a proposition set to appear on the ballot on May 21, 2024.

According to Superintendent Naomi Ryfun, this initiative helps poise the district for future opportunities. "The proposed land acquisition presents an invaluable opportunity for our district to secure space for future growth and innovation," Ryfun said. "It will enable us to better serve our students and community with a wide range of educational activities and initiatives."

The potential purchase aligns with the district's long-term strategic goals and commitment to providing exceptional educational opportunities. Detailed discussions regarding specific programming needs and land usage will follow, should the proposition receive approval. The proposed land acquisition is for a purchase price not to exceed \$295,000, plus any additional fees and transactional costs (closing costs) not to exceed a total cost of \$400,000. The plan is for the district to pay for the acquisition with voter authorization to withdraw and expend the said amount from the 2021 Construction Capital Reserve fund. This transaction is expected to have no tax impact on the taxpayers since funding from the reserves will be utilized.

Taxpayers are encouraged to stay informed about the proposition and participate in the upcoming vote on May 21, 2024, to shape the future of education in the district.
